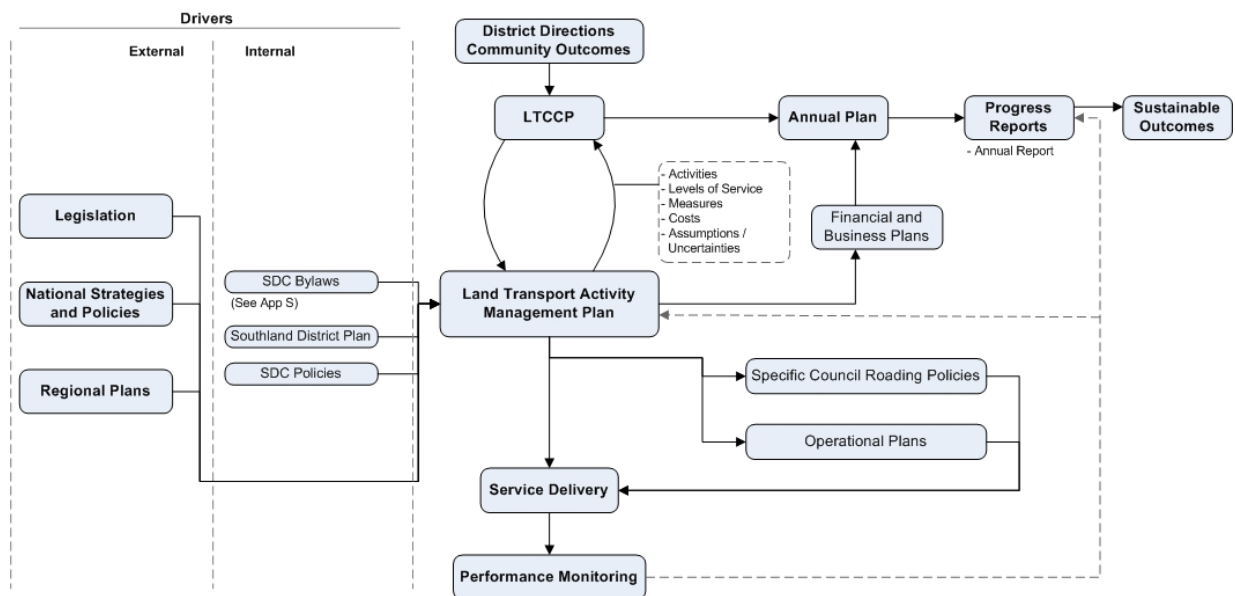

Telecommunications Act 2001	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Requires that RCAs provide access to operators of existing telecommunications networks, and that the operator may inspect, maintain or repair their assets.</li> <li>• Requires that RCAs trim or remove trees which interfere with network lines.</li> <li>• Requires that RCAs allow network operators to construct, place, and maintain public telephone cabinets, distribution cabinets, or any other similar appliances on a road.</li> <li>• Requires that where RCAs require a network line to be shifted, it will be done at their own cost.</li> <li>• Requires network operators to not place wires so that they interfere with traffic.</li> </ul>

Biosecurity Act 1993	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Requires RCAs to permit roadblocks to be established at MAF's (or other relevant Central Government agency) request and operated by the Police.</li> </ul>
Summary Offences Act 1991	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Enables the Police to charge people with offences affecting the road assets and their operation, including acts or things endangering safety, obstructing public way, billsticking, defacing and other wilful damage.</li> </ul>
